Program to lift Black students gets mired in culture wars

Backers criticize LAUSD for revamping plan in response to conservative Virginia group's complaint that race was illegally included among criteria

Under pressure after a conservative group took legal action, the Los Angeles Unified School District will overhaul a \$120-million academic program for struggling Black students by eliminating race as a factor in determining which children will be helped.

The decision has outraged supporters of the district's Black Student Achievement Plan, who are demanding that officials stand by the original program, which had begun to yield some early, positive results.

The Virginia-based group Parents Defending Education — whose mission is to oppose "destructive practices" in schools, including policies related to race, sexual orientation and gender identity - had filed a complaint in July 2023 with the federal Office for Civil Rights against BSAP.

It alleged the program violated the Constitution and the Civil Rights Act of 1964 by providing extra education services based on a student's race.

Over months of dialogue, federal officials told the district that a race-based program was legally unsustainable in light of multiple Supreme Court decisions, including the June 2023 ruling that struck down the consideration of race as a factor in college admissions.

The Virginia group's trustees include Edward Blum, who founded the organization behind the lawsuit leading to the 2023 Supreme Court ruling, according to tax filings.

State joins Kern River fight

Atty. Gen. Rob Bonta throws his support to environmentalists after thousands of fish die from water shutoff.

California officials have joined a legal effort to restore water to the Kern River after an abrupt shutoff of water dried up the river and killed thousands of fish in Bakersfield.

The decision by state officials and Atty. Gen. Rob Bonta to intervene in the court case gives new impetus to environmental groups as they try to compel the city of Bakersfield and agricultural water districts to bring back a flowing river.

Bonta announced Monday that he and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife filed a brief supporting the environmental groups in the case before the state's 5th District Court of Appeal.

'California's waterways and ecosystems are the lifeblood of our state's rich and diverse wildlife and natural habitats," Bonta said. "Yet, in Bakersfield, the sudden loss of Kern River flows due to the city officials' decisions to divert all water away from the river is leaving behind a dry wasteland where fish are dying in droves.

The river suddenly dried up along several miles of its channel in Bakersfield starting in late August. Those who first noticed the abrupt loss of water included Rae McNeish, an associate pro-[See Bakersfield, A7]

Will settlement end surfer harassment at Lunada Bay?

Some are skeptical a promise to protect public access will stop decades of hostility.

Lunada Bay is the stuff big wave surfers' dreams are

During a heavy swell, 20foot waves unfurl in a perfect right-hand line, delivering a potent blend of adrenaline and serenity.

"It feels like a little hit of a drug, honestly, because it's just so beautiful, so magical," surfer Sofly Matturi said. "The wave is your can-

When the surf's up, only a dozen or so surfers can be found riding the waves, tucked in a cove beneath the cliffs of the Palos Verdes Peninsula. Visiting Lunada Bay is like taking a time machine back to 1960, before hundreds of surfers crowded Southern California's coast-

Many surfers say there's

a reason for that.

For six decades, a group known as the Bay Boys has sought to rule the waves here, slashing the tires of nonlocals, pelting rocks at surfers descending the steep cliffside trail and physically harassing anyone brave enough to paddle out.

The Bay Boys' reign has sparked years of controversy and emerged as a flashpoint for beach access in the upscale community of Palos Verdes Estates, culminating with a landmark lawsuit de-[See Surfers, A7]
