

Estate of late builder Joe Cosgrave valued at €124m

Builder Joe Cosgrave left an estate with a gross value of €124 million and a net value – after debts are deducted – of €93 million, according to the grant of probate just issued.

The figure does not include show. assets he held as a trustee.

However, detectives appeared to be no closer to making arrests, with sources saying it would be a "strategic error" to arrest any persons of interest at this point in the investigation.

They added arrests could be made only when evidence gathered by the Garda provided the grounds for such a move.

"If you arrest someone now, it is then much harder to arrest them for a second time in the same investigation," said one source. "You'd have to have new grounds, new evidence, for a second arrest."

'Extraordinary'

Garda Commissioner Drew Harris said the possibility that a boy had been missing for two years and possibly murdered, and this having gone unnoticed for so long, was an "ex-traordinary incident".

The missing person's report suggested the mother and son's absence from their home in Drogheda had not been noticed until the morning of August 29th. A missing persons investigation was commenced and an appeal was made to the public for in-

formation. However, investigations since then have found no evidence Kyran was alive at any time since he was last seen at his Dundalk national school close to the end of school year in May or June 2022

Last week gardaí stood down their missing persons appeal, confirming Ms Durnin had been located in the UK

The Garda added it was assumed Kyran had been killed, with the inquiry into his whereabouts upgraded to a murder investigation.

Landlord Marc Godart has €25,000 arising from failing to register tenancies and knowingly giving false reasons to tenants for why they had to leave their apartments.

ported how tenants had been evicted from the apartments on the basis that the owner wanted to sell, only for the apartments then to be advertised for short-term letting on Airbnb. On Tuesday, another compa-ny owned by Mr Godart, Reu-

The latest list of sanctions published by the RTB shows that Green Label Property Investments, a company that holds property on behalf of Mr


Godart's business, was hit with monetary sanctions ranging from €500 to €13,000. It is the first time the RTB has imposed sanctions on Mr Godart's business, though tenants have brought successful complaints against him to the RTB and received monetary awards.

ben Street Hot Desks Ltd, was The latest sanctions and court orders published by the fined €1,500 in the District RTB include cases where landlords were sanctioned for failing to comply with the rent pressure zone laws that control rents in designated areas.

Landlord Anuj Katyal, of Amstelveen, the Netherlands, was given a monetary sanction of €15,000 for failing to comply with rent pressure zone requirements in respect of a property at Liffey Place, Liffey Valley Park, Lucan, Co Dublin. Landlord William Byrne, of Blackrock, Dublin, was sanc-

tioned €5,000 in respect of an apartment on Bachelors Walk, Dublin 1.

Landlords Thang Viet Dam and Ngoc Minh Nguyen, of Clonee, Dublin 15, were sanctioned a total of €22,434 in relation to two tenancies, at Premier Square, Finglas Road, Dublin 11, and Ongar Village, Dublin 15.



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
