Connolly landslide prompts call for more left-wing unity and soul-searching in FF

A sign of what can be achieved when left works together, says SF leader

Fianna Fáil TDs demand discussion on leader Micheál Martin's future

The fallout from the landslide win for Catherine Connolly in the presidential election this weekend began immediately.

Sinn Féin leader Mary Lou McDonald said the result was a sign of what could be achieved when left-wing parties worked together – while Fianna Fáil TDs demanded discussion of Micheál Martin's future.

Speaking on RTÉ, Ms Mc-Donald said Ms Connolly's victory showed people how parties other than Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael could win an election.

"When we come together, when we work collaboratively, when we show up for each other, we can win," she said, though she said the party would run its own candidate in the forthcoming Galway West bye-

Leaders of the other left-wing parties who supported Ms Connolly sounded similar notes during Saturday's count and after the results of the presidential election were announced at Dublin Castle.

Dr Colm Henry, chief clinical officer at the Health Service Executive (HSE), said last year's flu season was "very significant", largely attributing this to the dominant variant.

Dr Henry said the severity of flu season is largely driven by the dominant variant-type. He added: "We can't control the flu "The variant of flu we had subtype or the way it transmits,

but we can control the vaccine

Consequently, he said work is ongoing to encourage people to take up the vaccine.

"That's something our public health teams analyse," he said. "They're devising regional plans [and] identifying areas of low uptake - identifying groups where there's low uptake and focusing resources and maximising uptake in those groups.'
