NAVAL CENTERS IN JEOPARDY

Lawmakers move to shut down Reserve facilities, including one near Pittsburgh

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} WASHINGTON-In a move that \\ has sparked internal backlash \\ \end{tabular}$ among the nation's veterans, congressional leaders are threatening to shutdown the U.S. Naval Reserve Centers — including the hub near Pittsburgh — ending an institution that has served the military for generations, the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette has learned.

As part of a larger defense bill, the U.S. Senate voted earlier this month to eliminate more than 100 of the facilities, saying they no longer meet the needs of the Navy.

The action by the lawmakers on

Oct. 9, which includes the closing of the center west of Pittsburgh and others in Erie, Harrisburg, and Avoca (near Pittston), is detailed in a plan to dismantle the network that extends into every corner of the coun-

The vote comes just two months after Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth fired the chief of the Navy Reserve, Vice Adm. Nancy Lacore,

Federal workers in region impacted

Protracted impasse could affect thousands

WASHINGTON — They provide medical care for veterans and assistance to seniors on Social Security. They operate dams in local waterways and research some of the country's most vexing energy problems. They screen passengers at the airport and deliver the mail.

And as lawmakers squabble in Washington, their paychecks may be showing

More than 19,000 people in the eightcounty Pittsburgh metro area work for the federal government, collecting \$480 million in quarterly wages in positions that, on average, far exceed the median salary, according to the latest available quarterly

census of employment and wages.

But the federal government shutdown that began Oct. 1 has extended so long that many employees have now missed at least one full paycheck — a reality that's ramping up the financial pressure on workers and the political pressure on lawmakers who've refused to give an inch during the stalemate.

Both political parties have made their point, and still there is no clear end in sight," Everett Kelley, who leads the

Businesses step up as SNAP aid is set to expire

The entrance to Lelulo's Pizzeria looked more like a food pantry than a restaurant

early this week Tables were lined with jars of baby food, Snack Packs, loaves of bread and canned goods while refrigerators were stuffed with dairy, vegetables and meat Monday

afternoon. Shuffling in and out of the pizzeria was owner Patyn McCune, hauling bags of groceries from her car.

The restaurant in Plum is usually closed on Mondays. But Ms. McCune posted a message on the restaurant's Facebook page inviting anyone who needed help to come in and take what they needed between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. — no questions

Her gesture came as about 300,000 Pittsburgh-area residents are preparing to

Donations help fund school's field trips

Students at Minadeo PreK-5 will still get to enjoy their field trips this fall thanks to parents and community members who stepped in to cover costs as the state budget stalemate stretches beyond 100 days late.

A GoFundMe page was set up this month to help the Minadeo PTO raise funds to cover field trip transportation costs. Typically, those costs are covered by indi-

vidual schools, while at Minadeo, a Squirrel Hill school of 300 students, the PTO pays for admission of students and teachers during

So far, the GoFundMe has raised almost \$3,600.

'Blown away," Stephanie Kater, the vice president of the Minadeo PTO, a nonprofit organization separate from the school and district that focuses on enhancing the educational experience of Minadeo students, said of the funds. "I don't think any of us thought that it would get anywhere near what it has done.'

The GoFundMe was started amid the state budget impasse that has caused districts statewide, including Pittsburgh Public, to miss out on millions of dollars of state payments.

In response, the district earlier this month announced it was taking a "series of temporary fiscal safeguards" to preserve classroom operations and protect staff pay-

That included a hiring freeze for all vacant and newly vacated positions except those directly serving students in the classroom; suspending all nonessential purchases; restricting non-mandated travel and nonessential overtime; and placing a temporary hold on the execution of new or renewed contractual agreements not
