Was it DK Metcalf taking a swing at a Lions superfan wearing a blue wig and hanging over the railing in the front row?

Was it Kenneth Gainwell turning into Kenneth Catchwell and somehow sandwiching a

pass between his forearms as he lay horizontal on the Ford Field turf, rolling over and then popping back up to run the final 6 yards for a 45-yard touchdown? Or was it that Mr. Gainwell's

score only foreshadowed an even more confusing, even more controversial, even more surreal final play?

Lions quarterback Jared Goff scored a touchdown on a pass

that he threw himself, with a lateral in between, and that wasn't the most absurd part of the sequence. That would probably be the head official telling the crowd the ruling on the field is a touchdown — met with a triumphant chorus of cheers — but ... there was an offensive pass interference penalty on the

Lions, so the game is over. Still, plenty of the Detroit faithful kept roaring in celebration (perhaps including that guy who trolled Mr. Metcalf from the stands) because they didn't realize the flag negated that magical SuperGoff moment. It was all quite climactic and anticlimactic at the same time.

But for the Steelers, Sunday wasn't just their wildest game of the season. It also was their best win, their most impressive performance given the stakes.

## Downtown's \$600M face-lift takes shape

Heading into 2026, Downtown Pittsburgh remains in flux. But the key projects that are part of a historic bid to revamp the corridor are beginning to take shape.

Gov. Josh Shapiro last year visited the Cultural District to announce a landmark \$600 million investment in the Golden Triangle, heralded as the third major effort to upgrade the city's center in its history.

Following a spike in office vacancies during the COVID-19 pandemic, the plan promises to breathe new life into Downtown, converting aging

skyscrapers into new apartment buildings and renovating several public spaces.

Many of the plan's flagship projects faced critical setbacks this summer amid rising construction costs and routine delays. But progress is moving along, reshaping the area as it prepares to welcome hundreds of thousands of visitors when Pittsburgh hosts the NFL draft in the spring.

Major components of the governor's plan include:

• Seven residential projects, including multiple office-to-apartment

## COUNCIL APPROVES 20% TAX INCREASE

## Cites a 'very precarious financial position'

After a contentious process with competing narratives regarding the city's financial health, Pittsburgh City Council approved a budget for 2026 that includes a 20% tax increase.

Facing dwindling revenue sources and increased prices on expenses, council members said they saw a need to increase the property tax rate.

"We have been told under no uncer-

"We have been told under no uncertain terms ... that we are in a very precarious financial position," Councilwoman Barb Warwick said Sunday morning. She introduced a 30% increase earlier this month, which was lowered to 20% Sunday. "This has been made loud and clear to council members, so I felt that it was imperative that we act on that information."

That increase will bring in an extra \$28 million in revenue. A resident with a home assessed at \$100,000 will pay an extra \$8.73 a month, or about \$105 annually.

Throughout the budgeting process and still on Sunday, as council met in Downtown's City-Council building to vote on the 2026 budget, members have been

# DOJ official stands by decision

## Democrats cry foul over records' partial release

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche on Sunday defended the Justice Department's decision to release just a fraction of the Jeffrey Epstein files by the congressionally mandated deadline as necessary to protect survivors of sexual abuse by the disgraced financier.

Mr. Blanche pledged that the Trump administration eventually would meet its obligation required by law. But he stressed that the department was obligated to act with caution as it goes about making public thousands of documents that can include sensitive information.

Friday's partial release of the Epstein files has led to a new crush of criticism from Democrats who have accused the Republican administration of trying to hide information.

Mr. Blanche called that pushback
