## **GAINEY CLAIMS SUCCESS AS MAYORAL TERM ENDS**

Others see missed chances: 'I think they got in their own way'

Four years after being elected amid the COVID-19 pandemic and becoming Pittsburgh's first Black mayor in a predominantly white city long shaped by segregation, Ed Gainey is proud of what his administration accomplished.

"I'm very satisfied with what we did here," Mr. Gainey said in a recent interview in his Downtown office assessing his sometimes tumultuous term. "We did what they said we

## AFTER THE **STORMS**

From Wheeling to Wilkinsburg, region still reeling from a wild year

TRIADELPHIA, W.Va. — Ashley Berka had just returned home from her son's baseball game.

It was June 14, the day before Father's Day, and she was planning an early celebratory dinner for her husband, a firefighter for the Triadelphia Volunteer Fire Department. Ms. Berka stepped outside to check on her three rose bushes before starting dinner

at about 6 p.m. It was sunny, she recalled. Before long, it started to rain — a lot. Too much in too short of a period of time for the creeks to sustain. The National Weather Service would later say that several inches had fallen in about 45 minutes.

Flash flooding tore through the town, and Ms. Berka remembered hearing screams and wailing sirens coming from across the creek. Within five minutes, the 100-year-old Little Wheeling Creek bridge

that leads to her house was swept away. And the 30-year-old, who was eight months pregnant, was trapped. It was a high-risk pregnancy — if Ms. Berka went into labor without the proper medical treatment, she and her baby could die.

### **Insurance** premiums spike with new year

After 18 years of marriage and a divorce, finalized in 2014, the Upper Burrell couple found themselves side-by-side again Dec. 18. Joining them — not in a church or court-house but over a Microsoft Teams call — was Buff Jackson from the Allegheny County

Department of Court Records. Eight witnesses — including their twin daughters, coincidentally celebrating their birthday that day — looked on as they confirmed their marriage license application, choosing the self-uniting option to make it official. The video call took place during Mary Jo's lunch break, and the plan was to mark the occasion with a lighthearted exchange of vows later that evening during happy hour at the Hayloft in West Deer.
