



Trump and Xi Open High-Stakes Beijing Summit With Taiwan Warning and Chip Deal Hopes

President Donald Trump arrived in Beijing on Wednesday for the first visit by a sitting U.S. president to China in nearly a decade, kicking off a two-day summit with Chinese President Xi Jinping that covered trade, artificial intelligence, Taiwan, and the ongoing U.S.-Israel war on Iran. The visit is focused on trade, regional security, and strengthening bilateral ties between the world's two largest economies.

At the Great Hall of the People, Xi issued a stark warning that the U.S. and China "will have clashes and even conflicts" if the Taiwan issue is mishandled. Beijing's state broadcaster said Taiwan remains the most important issue in China-U.S. relations. Yet the broader tone was notably conciliatory,

with Xi saying the two sides agreed to pursue a "constructive strategic" relationship over the next three years and beyond.

The summit also produced a notable alignment on the Strait of Hormuz: Secretary of State Marco Rubio told NBC News that Xi agreed both nations opposed militarizing the strait or allowing Iran to impose tolls on shipping traffic — a significant diplomatic signal given the ongoing war's disruption to global oil flows.

Joining Trump aboard Air Force One was a roster of American business titans: Nvidia CEO Jensen Huang, Tesla CEO Elon Musk, and Apple CEO Tim Cook, reflecting the centrality of technology and commerce to the meetings. A

Reuters exclusive revealed that the U.S. has cleared approximately 10 Chinese firms — including Alibaba, Tencent, ByteDance and JD.com — to purchase Nvidia's H200 AI chips, but not a single delivery has been made, with Chinese firms pulling back after guidance from Beijing. Huang hopes the summit will unlock that stalled trade.

Trump also told Fox News that Xi agreed to order 200 Boeing jets during the meetings — a significant commercial win, though below the 500-plane estimate some analysts had floated. Both sides are expected to continue discussions through Friday, with Trump also inviting Xi to the White House for a September visit.

Russia Unleashes Largest Aerial Assault on Kyiv, Kills Nine Including Child

Russia carried out what Kyiv's mayor described as "the enemy's largest-scale attack on the capital" in a combined drone and missile barrage overnight into Thursday, killing at least nine people — including a 12-year-old girl — and injuring more than 44. The attack came hours after a rare daytime assault using over 800 drones on May 13 that killed at least six. In total, Russia bombarded Ukraine with more than 1,600 drones and missiles over a 30-hour stretch.

A residential building in Kyiv's Darnytskyi district partially collapsed, trapping people under rubble; rescue workers saved 27 people from the wreckage. Attacks also struck Kharkiv, Odesa, Poltava, Zaporizhzhia, and Ivano-Frankivsk, damaging energy infrastructure and a railway locomotive. The city of Kyiv declared a day of mourning.

President Zelensky said Russia had "stockpiled drones and missiles" during its self-declared May 9 ceasefire and deliberately timed the strike to maximize scale and challenge air defenses. Analysts noted Russia has switched to a new tactic combining massive daytime and overnight attacks, likely to increase civilian harm.

Jerusalem Day March Raises Tensions as Israeli Nationalists March Through East Jerusalem

Large crowds of ultranationalist Israelis gathered on Thursday for the annual Jerusalem Day march, passing through occupied East Jerusalem's predominantly Palestinian neighborhoods, waving Israeli flags and shouting slogans. Israeli National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir made a controversial visit to the Al-Aqsa Mosque compound — the third holiest site in Islam —

Russia's Largest 30-Hour Aerial Barrage Kills Dozens Across Ukraine, Levels Kyiv Buildings

Russia unleashed its largest aerial assault in the war over a 30-hour period, firing more than 1,600 drones and missiles at Ukraine. The first wave — a massive daytime attack on May 13 with over 800 drones — killed at least six people. A second overnight wave then struck Kyiv, killing nine more, including a 12-year-old girl, with 20 people still missing as of midday Thursday.

A residential building in Kyiv's Darnytskyi district partially collapsed, trapping residents under rubble; 27 were rescued. A power substation and high-voltage power line were damaged. Attacks also struck Kharkiv (injuring 28), Ivano-Frankivsk (10 casualties), Odesa, Rivne (3 killed), Poltava, and Zaporizhzhia. Russia launched more than 670 attack drones and 56 missiles in the overnight wave alone.

Zelensky said Russia had exploited its self-declared May 9 ceasefire to stockpile munitions and deliberately timed the attack for maximum scale. Russia's total combat losses since the invasion now stand at an estimated

earlier in the day, inflaming tensions. Thousands participate in the march each year, which Palestinian residents and advocates describe as a provocative assertion of Israeli dominance over the city.

Border Patrol Chief Michael Banks Resigns Abruptly, Adding to Immigration Turnover

U.S. Border Patrol Chief Michael Banks abruptly resigned on Thursday, an agency spokesperson confirmed, adding to significant turnover among top Trump administration immigration officials. No reason was given for Banks' departure. He was named to the role by President Trump in January 2025 and had been allied with former Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem, who was fired by Trump in March.

During Banks' tenure, the Trump administration surged Border Patrol agents into major U.S. cities to round up suspected immigration violators. The agency reported approximately 86,000 migrant arrests at the border in Trump's first year — down sharply from 956,000 the year before. CBP Commissioner Rodney Scott praised Banks, saying "the border was transformed from chaos to the most secure border ever recorded."



Senate Confirms Kevin Warsh as Federal Reserve Chair in Most Partisan Vote Ever

The Senate confirmed Kevin Warsh as the 17th chair of the Federal Reserve on Wednesday in a 54-45 vote — the most partisan confirmation of a Fed chair in history. Only one Democrat, Sen. John Fetterman of Pennsylvania, crossed the aisle to vote for Warsh, who takes over from Jerome Powell as Powell's term expires Friday.

Warsh inherits a central bank under pressure from both Trump — who wants lower rates — and from resurgent inflation driven by the Iran war's

disruption to oil markets. Wholesale prices soared 6% in April, the largest monthly increase since December 2022. Warsh has vowed to use his independent judgment on rates, pledging not to take orders from the White House. His first FOMC meeting is scheduled for June 16-17.

NJ Transit Cuts World Cup Rail Ticket Price to \$98 as Tournament Approaches

NJ Transit has reduced its round-trip rail ticket price to \$98 for fans traveling to FIFA World Cup matches at New York New Jersey Stadium (the temporarily renamed MetLife Stadium) in East Rutherford. The price reduction came after public criticism of initially higher fare proposals. FIFA has eliminated parking at the stadium, meaning public transit and ride-sharing will be the primary options for fans. During matches, NJ Transit buses are expected to run every 30 seconds. A limited number of premium parking spots near the American Dream complex will be available for over \$200 per match for those who choose to drive.

NJ Redistricting Debate Intensifies as Senate President Weighs Mid-Decade Move

New Jersey Senate President Scutari declared there is "no debate about the need to redistrict" in the state, signaling the Legislature may move forward with a rare mid-decade redistricting effort. Governor Mikie Sherrill separately launched a statewide employee survey to strengthen the state workforce. NJ's housing supply continues to lag behind population growth, and an AARP poll found residents broadly oppose plans to scale back the StayNJ property tax relief plan.

Vietnam U17 Makes Historic FIFA World Cup Debut; VN-Index Rises 1.43%

Vietnam's U17 national football team achieved a historic milestone, securing the country's first-ever place at the FIFA U17 World Cup with a dramatic comeback victory over UAE, fighting back from behind to win 3-2. Thai media praised the Vietnamese squad's resilience after the match. Separately, Vietnam's stock market index, the VN-Index, rose 1.43% on May 14, as investor confidence remained solid amid the government's push toward double-digit GDP growth — a 10%-or-higher target set by the National Assembly for 2026.

Nvidia H200 Chip Sales to China Cleared But Stalled — CEO Huang in Beijing Seeking Breakthrough

A Reuters exclusive revealed that the U.S. Commerce Department has cleared approximately 10 Chinese firms — including Alibaba, Tencent, ByteDance, JD.com, and distributors Lenovo and Foxconn — to purchase Nvidia's H200 AI chips. However, not a single delivery has been made, as Chinese firms pulled back from purchases after guidance from Beijing, which is pushing domestic firms toward Chinese-made chips from Huawei and others.

Nvidia CEO Jensen Huang joined Trump's Beijing delegation — Trump picked him up in Alaska en route to the summit — in hopes of unlocking the stalled deal. Huang told CCTV he hoped Trump and Xi would build on their relationship to improve commercial ties. Before U.S. export curbs tightened, Nvidia commanded about 95% of China's advanced chip market. Each approved buyer can purchase up to 75,000 H200 chips under current licensing terms.

Cerebras Systems IPO Doubles on Debut, Biggest U.S. Semiconductor Offering on Record

AI chipmaker Cerebras Systems made its stock market debut on the Nasdaq on Thursday under the ticker CBRS, with shares more than doubling from the \$185 IPO price. The company raised \$5.55 billion in the offering — the largest U.S. semiconductor IPO on record and the biggest U.S. tech IPO since Uber in 2019. Cerebras, which builds the largest commercial chip ever produced (roughly the size of an iPad), is positioning itself as a Nvidia rival in the AI accelerator market. CEO Andrew Feldman said the IPO is "the right way to fund our growth."

Foxconn Hit by Ransomware Attack; Hackers Claim Breach of Major Apple-Nvidia Supplier

Ransomware hackers have claimed responsibility for breaching Foxconn, a key manufacturer for tech giants including Apple, Google, and Nvidia, and are attempting extortion. The attack raises alarms about vulnerabilities in global tech supply chains. Foxconn did not immediately respond to requests for comment. The incident comes at a sensitive moment as Foxconn is also one of the companies approved as a Nvidia H200 chip distributor in China.

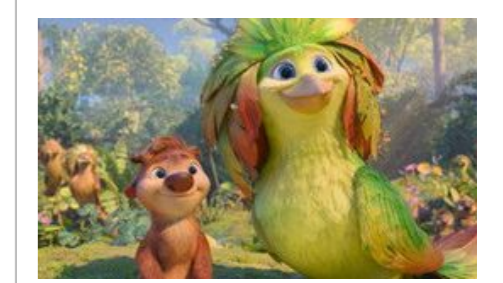
The Sheep Detectives

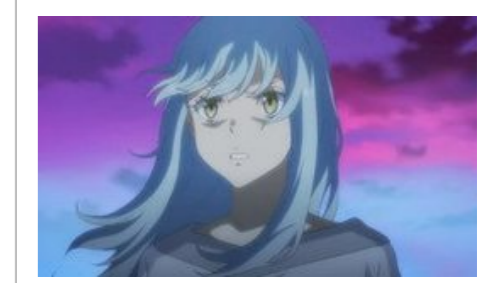
